The program "Through Australian Eyes" by
William Fitzwater is a successful television series
presenting the perspectives of six young Australian
girls born of migrant parents who have travelled
to their parents homelands in order to find their
true identity. These girls have been broughts up in
between two cultures — Australian and their parents cultures.



For example, Jessie Thandi. She is an Abstralian born Indian. At bomes like many of the girk she is uncertain or congused whether she is an Australian or an Indian. At home she wears the traditional sari and speaks the sixth language; and at school stre wears jeans and acts like any other Australian teenager. Therefore, she went into the Thandi village - her parents birthplace and try to find which side is she part who she really is. Jessie believes that on her journey she will find some good things about India not because all this time she has heard nothing else but slorny and dirty India. Jessie later on found these positive things about India but at the end however, she is more Conjused whether she is an Australian or an Indian. Many of the girls perspectives about their backgrand

countries and have come from their parents. For

example Angela Sarantis.

Angela is an Australian born Greek. All the things she knew about Greece have come from her mother therefore, she went into Greece

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to see things is they are now disperent to what she har been told by her mother. It is a journey of exploration for Angela. And in her parents village she feels connected to the land, somehow she feels that she has been there begone. And she comes to know her father athorn she never trew (he died when she was 4 years old); she began to see things through her fathers eyes. When she had to leave the village she something that she would not want to live in the village however, she has expersence more of life in her two weeks in Greece than in her whole life in the stralia.

These girls perspectives have now changed their persceptions towards a different world with a different point of view.

The second text that I have studied this year is the The Stoler Children Their Storier edited by Carmel Bird. This is a series of stories, recounted in the first person by these very people who were part of the Stolen Generation. These childrens (who are now adults)

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have experienced a life of harsh treatment and croel punishments. Milicent D, for example, was one of the stolen children who have suffered a life of torment, stated: " All they contributed to our upbringing and future is an unrepairable scar of loneliness, mistrust, hatred and bitterness". These & This similar ment can be found throughout the book. These comments have resolted in Carmel Birdes sympathetic actions towards the Aboriginal people. She believes that it was nothing else but a systematic genocide" and her comment was supported by Labour senator Crocily. Who Hendron On the other side, the government believes that there were no such thing as stolen generation. These Aboriginal children were being removed from their families or in a nother term 'saved' from their slomy, dirty and uneducational environments which were their families. Troely, the different perspectives on this Issue is potting Australian fotore on hold.
