

(a) Aishia Bint ABU BAKR ~~was~~ the third wife of the prophet Muhammad, although 18 when he died she made several contributions to Islam. Her major contributions, were her adding 2000 verses to the hadith, widely consulted books of Islam. She also was fundamental in changing the divorce laws that impacted on ^{Islamic} Muslim women. Aisha's contribution extended on into still be remembered today.

(b) Aishia Bint ABU BAKR impacted heavily on the Islamic faith, she was often referred to as "Mother of believers" and "the lover of the lover of God" which she still holds to her name. (c) Islamic funerals are a rite of passage marking a transition from this life to the next. Islamic funerals are a significant event in valuing the person who could rightfully meet Allah. Islamic funerals also reinforce key Islamic beliefs. The funeral prayer (salat-al-janaza) helps the family pray together for the deceased in the hope of meeting Allah. Body washing and the five steps in preparing the body is to reinforce the belief in that the deceased is spiritually cleansed for when they meet Allah. The belief in as the deceased is dying, saying "Allah" into their ear as it was the first word they heard when they were born reinforces a key Islamic belief and practice. Reading from the Quran reinforces beliefs about the five pillars. Funerals are a possibility in the which the family reflect on the deceased's life and through reinforcing beliefs, reflect on the possibility of meeting Allah.
