Anngs, For east example of Gordon Bennett as an artist depicts issues of our history in Australia & the social allegory of the European & aboriginal cultures He was brought up thinking he was an inelander, only finding att later on in life his true aboriginal Identity, which then become the bosons for all his concepts & ideas within his "Inhipping flece" where Bennett displayed a black box, made to the dimensions of his own body, with welt/cut marks using his scarring technique on the top of the lidge the box-where he squeezed red point directly from the tube & allowed to dry



pointing over the top with black, then cutting a stip out of the middle to retreal the red underneath symbolising a welt mark with the blood on the black skin of an aboriginal. Gordon would then proceed to wear white cloth over his head to cover expressing houses of poin, suffering 2 anger, he take continuously whipped the box, encouraging the audience to take their proper out on the black box, symbolis/ro the aboriginal people. With thisas Gordons intent for people to express their anger, was not always the outcome of meaning nieved. The meaning of this work depends greatly upon the audience viewing H. For example a group of ort students who had just done see a case Study on Gordon Bennett and understood his context & background can appreciate



and understand the intended meaning of the work, while if this audienced changed to young children for example, the intendence mooning of the work would be completely lost resulting in them becoming terrified of the man in the white cloth, in fear of him whipping them too.

The point being without the background knowledge of the artist & their back intention often works of artists go completely misunderstood, conveying Meaning to the few who do understand, while leaving others completely be wildered questioning why they've done what they've have & what exactly was the meaning of it all. Artworks of today rely greatly upon their audience for the meaning of the work to be interpreted, which can also these ad to the emotional intensity of some works



as they can be understood on various levels of conceptual complexity.

Ultimately this very important for us an audience to understand the importance of our personal contexts as to how we Judge interpret & understand the meaning of various works, keeping an open mind and looking at the work afrom all aspects & points of view to get a benefit from the artwork and the avtists intent.
