validity of cicero's argument & to his attack of catiline's character which teads poto primers ho senatés resolve. In addition to te use of a persona, Cicerós use of listing (" grem else hostem ... peraltorum") emphasiles he depravity, in every way, of catilines maracter, especially mrough emphasising mate continually that this man is the leaner of an enemy camp + is still within the state, this too gains anappar weight to Cicevo's pleas to a stop catiline. In addition by contrasting what the licero is doing, to What he Will soom to have done, matil allowing Catiline to go to nis friends ("utaus te non emissus.... videatur) it allows Gicero to have a "win-wih" situation thus again anining emphasis fornis argument. The use of "Nonne", implying a yes answer also allows me responded of te senators to be shappa by licero's unaerlying valves Finnally by elluring to those mings hold



booth up by me senate, mat is me laws (leges) to wstoms of her ancestors (mosne majorum) *DABBOOK THE SUPPORT OF HE SENALE IS ONCE Again gained, mis too emphasises mat without Ciceros actions the states valves are being let down & so incites to senators to action. This sense is prenered through the aceros no of vhetorical question which emphasise that something must be done. In this way, through Giceros rhetorical techniques sum as using to point of view of to wrom, listing, wontraiting, the choice of words, & the ellusion to held up valves & rhetorical greations all add to to earphany by weight of Giceros argument by firthering he appraised of Cariline while gaining he support of he senate.
